## TIME DOES NOT PASS AT PINNER HIGH SCHOOL. IT RUNS, FAST, EVER FORWARD: HOW ARE WE ABOUT TO START OUR THIRD YEAR?

At first, a dusty office with no phone. Then the end of our first year, 150 students and a visiting inspector judging that we have 'the model for an outstanding school'. Students, parents and staff all rating the school 'outstanding' in all categories. Fast forward a year, and time continues to be our greatest test: what does an outstanding Pinner High School education look like after just two years?

Over 25 sports teams took to the field, court and pitch this year. Amongst them are borough champions and county representatives, and those who have yet to win a match. All of them bring life to the Pinner High School Values, as we celebrate success and recognise participation.

The same is true in performance: close to 60 students were involved in our second musical production 'Beauty and the Beast', building on the success of 'Bugsy Malone' last year. Soloists and chorus line, front of house and back stage, the resilience and dedication of all involved, not to mention their creativity and enthusiasm, was a delight to see.

Elsewhere in this magazine you can read about our 3 International Trips in our first 5 terms, 10 speakers in our new Q?rius programme, and a climate for learning that was described as 'relentless' by our most recent inspectors. Now we are the sole occupants of our fabulous site on Beaulieu Drive, students have been busy helping me prioritise for the £4.2 million refurbishment that is still to come. We have inherited excellent independent school facilities, including books in the library and nets on the tennis courts. By the time the refurbishment is completed our learning environment will possibly only be exceeded by our aspirations for our students' success.

So what does an outstanding Pinner High School education look like? Numbers may be small, but opportunities at Pinner High School are writ large: in the classroom, on the stage or sports field, and in shaping our first class school. Time is unlikely to slow down for the foreseeable future.

# Q?RIUS-ER CURIOUSER



'Q?rius' is about intellectual curiosity in all its forms. Beth Hindmarsh joined us in September 2017 as Head of our Trailblazing Year 8. She was previously a Leadership Development Officer at TeachFirst, the charity working to empower people to make education fair. She has a degree in History from the University of Cambridge and a Teaching qualification and Masters in Educational Leadership from the Institute of Education/University College London. Who better to lead our new programme to stimulate thinking and a thirst for knowledge?

Beth writes "Q?rius follows on from the successes of Year 7 Homework Club, where students explore links between subjects through project based learning. Topics in Homework Club have been as diverse as environmentalism, Chinese New Year and Democracy. The challenge at Pinner High School is always to make this year even better than the last, and Q?rius does this in lots of ways. It sits alongside the GCSE options process, the first important and independent decision students make about their education. Where will it take them? What will come next? It leads into careers guidance, and preparation for a positive future. We've invited speakers from all different careers and walks of life. Each speaker spoke about their own time at school, the route into where they are now and what their day to day lives are like, followed by the opportunity to ask questions. Not everyone will want to be a strategy consultant, but all students can hear the message about working hard at school to reach a top university, to ensure you have options about where to take your own future.

Memorable moments have been plentiful: the stories of the adventures our journalist went on to get the inside scoop across the world, talking to all different communities. This included finding her way into a Turkish military camp by mistake and being politely asked to leave! We had insights into the fascinating dual role of a vicar keeping a 500-year-old Pinner building running alongside his religious duties supporting his parish. The Criminal Barrister's life before the Bar, working with those on death row in the USA and sharing her experiences of the American legal system, contrasted with evenings spent reading WhatsApp conversations as evidence in the UK. This certainly pricked the students' attention.

Especially thought provoking was the speaker from 'Breaking the Cycle', a survivor of youth violence, who spoke to us about his experience of being stabbed unprovoked when he was just 16. This left him paralysed, and he talked us through his journey to forgiveness. Students were able to reflect on their own experiences, and ways to forgive others when life takes an unexpected turn.

The pupils have been very curious in their questions of the speakers, from practical tips of how to get into careers, advice on GCSE options, to gory details of police cases. The question however that keeps cropping up: 'who pays you?', 'are you paid for every four minutes work?', 'how much do you get paid?' These were either answered or well dodged! One speaker responded back with 'how much do you they think I get paid?' With an answer of '£200' students were unclear if this was hourly, daily, weekly, or monthly!

It has been an eye opening speakers series that has allowed the pupils to see how their learning translates to the outside world that awaits them when they leave school. It's supported them to see how the choices they make for their GCSEs can place them onto the necessary path for a career and for many who are still not sure what they'd like to do has allowed them to see the variety of jobs waiting for them. We are busy planning next year's programme- do get in touch if you have a story to share."

## PINNERGOGY

The discipline of learning- pedagogy- as practised at Pinner High School and how this influences inspiring learners

Discussing pedagogical ideas leads to sharing good practice in classrooms. That leads to better experiences for students in school. 'Pinnergogy' is the term we use at Pinner High School to capture the distinctive brand of active learning that sets our learners apart.

It complements our school motto of 'Inspiring Learning'. Miss Amrania, teacher of Science, comments how it "involves engaging lessons which aim to challenge students' preconceptions; students are encouraged to evaluate the knowledge presented to them, nurturing leaders and not just followers." Miss Smyth, Assistant Headteacher, says Pinnergogy is about "creative, engaging and student-led learning."

Mrs Gillard, teacher of Geography, coined the term 'Pinnergogy' and notes how the concept of a lifelong learner involves teachers continually honing their practice. "The structure around which we have been sharing ideas comes from the influential book 'Making Every Lesson Count' by Shaun Allison and Andy Tharby. The book gives practical teaching strategies in order to connect research findings with classroom experiences. We discuss the six core concepts identified by the book; challenge, explanation, modelling, practice, feedback and questioning to focus and develop our practice."

She continues "Inspiring learning to me means challenging students to achieve the very best they can. As my students will know, I am interested in how the brain, and in particular, how our memory works. I try to work with this through frequent recall of information to develop students' long term retention of content and by linking concepts together to make for interesting and memorable connections. It is from this strong foundation in Key Stage 3 that we develop understanding during students' GCSE courses. Hopefully it also maximises the enjoyment of learning. Ms Brown, Head of Science, explains it as "role playing abstract concepts before proving them with a practical."

Pinnergogy also means teachers maintaining their professional skills. We are part of the Harrow Collegiate Teaching School Alliance, which provides first class, practical development courses to further develop good practice in the classroom. Headteacher Chris Woolf comments that "we have exceptional colleagues; over 650 people have applied to work at Pinner High School, and I've been very picky, which means we have a very well qualified staff. But we never stand still, and keeping such talented teachers at the top of their game means that 'Inspiring Learning' is about teachers too, and our learning community as a whole. Being recognised with the Princes Teaching Institute Mark, and being part of educational research projects such as the Anna Freud Mindfulness Project through University College London illustrates our commitment to this."

Mr. Allaway, Head of English, writes about Pinner High School's involvement in the UCL research programme: "Innovation is key at Pinner High School. Our motto of 'Inspiring Learning' acts as a daily reminder to all in the school community that this is a school in which we embrace opportunities to enhance the learning of our students. The school's practice of mindfulness is just one way in which this motto comes to life within the walls of Pinner High School. Since our very first term in September 2016 our students have had opportunities to learn and practise mindfulness. Participants in Miss Lowder's Mindfulness Club, one of the clubs offered as part of The Head's Challenge, have benefited from learning about the bridge between their emotions and their bodies and how developing a 'mindful' approach to this can afford them more control over both.

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This term, we have been thrilled to take our engagement with mindfulness to an even greater level by securing a place on the Anna Freud National Centre for Children and Families research project into the mental health of children and young people, in collaboration with University College London. Classes from both year groups have since experienced two mindfulness sessions each week at the start of their lessons with Miss Lowder, Mr Knowles or myself. We each visited University College London for a training session as part of the programme, which provided many insights to help us support our students' mental health even more.

Where once the starts of lessons were a flurry of bags and the search for pens, students now spend ten minutes focussing on their breathing or noticing thoughts and emotions as they pass through their minds. Some classes have also used colouring and music exercises to help them access a more mindful perspective.

The mental health of young people is a nationally recognised issue, with everyone from Ed Sheeran to the Duchess of Cambridge promoting the importance of supporting teenagers with their mental well-being. Our work with The Anna Freud Centre ensures that Pinner High School is at the cutting edge of this practice."

Best practice has also been recognised in the Maths and Science departments with the award of the prestigious Princes Teaching Institute Mark in both subject areas.

The Mark recognises how schools and departments are increasing challenge within the curriculum, enthusing pupils with activities beyond the curriculum, developing staff's own specialist subject knowledge and developing subject-based links outside the school. The benefits to students at Pinner High of learning with departments that have this accolade is very clear.

Miss Hindmarsh, Head of Year 8 and teacher of History says that "Pinnergogy means the development of young critical minds, because 'Inspiring Learning' involves daring to question and explore what you don't know. When I walk around Pinner High School I see lessons where students are challenged and supported to think for themselves. That's Pinnergogy!"







# FULL HOUSE

PE teacher Ryan Surridge had a challenge on his appointment as one of the Trailblazing staff: to create a climate of 'sport for all' whilst quite literally stretching our most able athletes. A vibrant House system and highly competitive representative sports teams are the cornerstones of how he has accomplished this so successfully.



From day one the signs were good: a tug of war House competition in which every student in every form took part. A sports hall filled with students on their first day at secondary school, heaving unwieldy ropes, roaring on their new classmates. Heavyweight Ali House outsprinted by Bannister House in the final standings, but the important result was the shared experience and the immediate bonds created. It's much easier to make friends when you are pulling in the same direction, and easier still when you all land in a heap together. The same term, the boys football team were crowned borough champions, the girls netball runners-up.

In year two over twenty one teams have represented the school. Every team is a chance to stretch and challenge, to bring life to the Pinner Values. The final ball victory over Avanti House lives long in the memory of the cricket team, so too the athletes who qualified for the county team. Every event winner at Sports Day expects to set a school record!

Not everyone can represent the school, but everyone has the opportunity to play for their House. Dodgeball, rounders, table tennis, basketball, football provide a range of sports in which students can play for their House. But the House competition is far more than a sports programme. The Spanish Spelling Bee is a highlight, where students translate and spell in front of their cheering peers. The spaghetti and marshmallow tower building engineering event was a hit. Our Transport for London Youth Travel Ambassadors competition to design an Oyster Card holder for the school provided a chance for others to shine.

All of these House events provide opportunities for students to find areas of their own strength, and the boost to their self-esteem this provides. A House system builds in a sense of community and belonging across the school, and reminds students of Roger Bannister's belief, emblazoned on the wall outside the newly refurbished changing rooms:

World Book Day celebrations this year included 'Journey to Jo'burg' author Beverly Naidoo speaking to the whole school, and doing some follow up workshops with students. Beverly is a Carnegie Medal winning writer from South Africa, where she lived until her twenties, before settling in the UK. She is a prolific writer, famous for 'The Other Side of Truth' and 'No Turning Back: a Novel of South Africa'. After the presentation to students, they were asked to write her a letter in their English lesson.

Dear Beverley Naidoo,

Thank you for coming to Pinner High School even though it was very snowy. You must have woken up early and travelled a long way to our school. We were very happy to see you. I learnt a lot about race relations from you and your book, how if you were black and you sat on a white person's bench you could get in so much trouble.

The bit where you talked about how a woman was under house arrest for five years and after that experience went around freeing people was very touching. You said she was very inspirational and a great person in history, which I agree with. You also talked about how people were put in prison because they were standing up for their rights like Nelson Mandela.

You said that when you were growing up there were white people's schools, benches and seats on buses and people were segregated by their skin colour. This just doesn't seem right. Many black people didn't have a job so they couldn't afford food. In your book you talked about the two characters needing food and some slaves gave them oranges. We'll learn more about this in history lessons, but it was really interesting hearing about it from your book. It felt like we were there.

You said your book was very hard to publish and that the publishers said that the book was not suitable for children. You probably went through around 10 publishers for your amazing book to be published. You lined up all your books, which was around 15, and read the opening to a lot of them. They really grabbed my attention.

Thank you so much for coming in during our terrible weather and travelling so far. You were enthusiastic and kind and open to answering all our questions. We learnt so much, not just about books and writing. Thank you.
